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Episteme is a general journal of epistemology in the analytic tradition that invites both informal and formal approaches. Among its primary "traditional" topics are knowledge, justification, evidence, reasons, rationality, skepticism, truth, probability, epistemic norms and values, and methodology. The journal devotes special attention to issues in social epistemology, including testimony, trust, disagreement, relativism, diversity and expertise, collective judgment, and the epistemic assessment of social institutions (e.g., science, law, democracy, and the media). The journal welcomes interdisciplinary approaches to epistemology that borrow methods from allied disciplines such as experimental psychology, linguistics, economics, game theory, evolutionary theory, and computer simulation studies.

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Editor's Statement

Epistemology has long been a flagship subject within philosophy and remains so today. Epistemologists are bursting with fresh ideas about knowledge, rationality, and justification. Social epistemology is one of the liveliest movements in recent years, devoted to understanding how people can expand their knowledge by finetuned reactions to the reports of others, and by well-advised deployment of social systems, networks, and institutions that influence the generation and transmission of knowledge. The journal *Episteme*, which pioneered this movement in its first eight years, now moves to Cambridge University Press. There it will continue to highlight this subfield while simultaneously broadening its remit to encompass all of epistemology. In its new guise, it welcomes both informal and formal approaches to knowledge, both traditional and interdisciplinary methodologies. It thereby becomes the only journal published by a major press that is dedicated wholly to epistemology. *Episteme* invites contributions on topics that range from skepticism to the value of knowledge to computer-aided simulation of social epistemic networks.
